Less straightforward is work **Julia Kul**, a Fullbright resident who hails from Poland. Her video "Passport Reading" involves an acting out of the data of her Polish passport, and her written Polish food menu in "Artist as a Restaurant" includes a secret message to America hidden behind QR codes.

An artist who probably doesn't need an introduction is **Jayson Musson**, whose instructional videos on art practice and art history recited by his alter ego "Hennessy Youngman" are positively blowing up.
