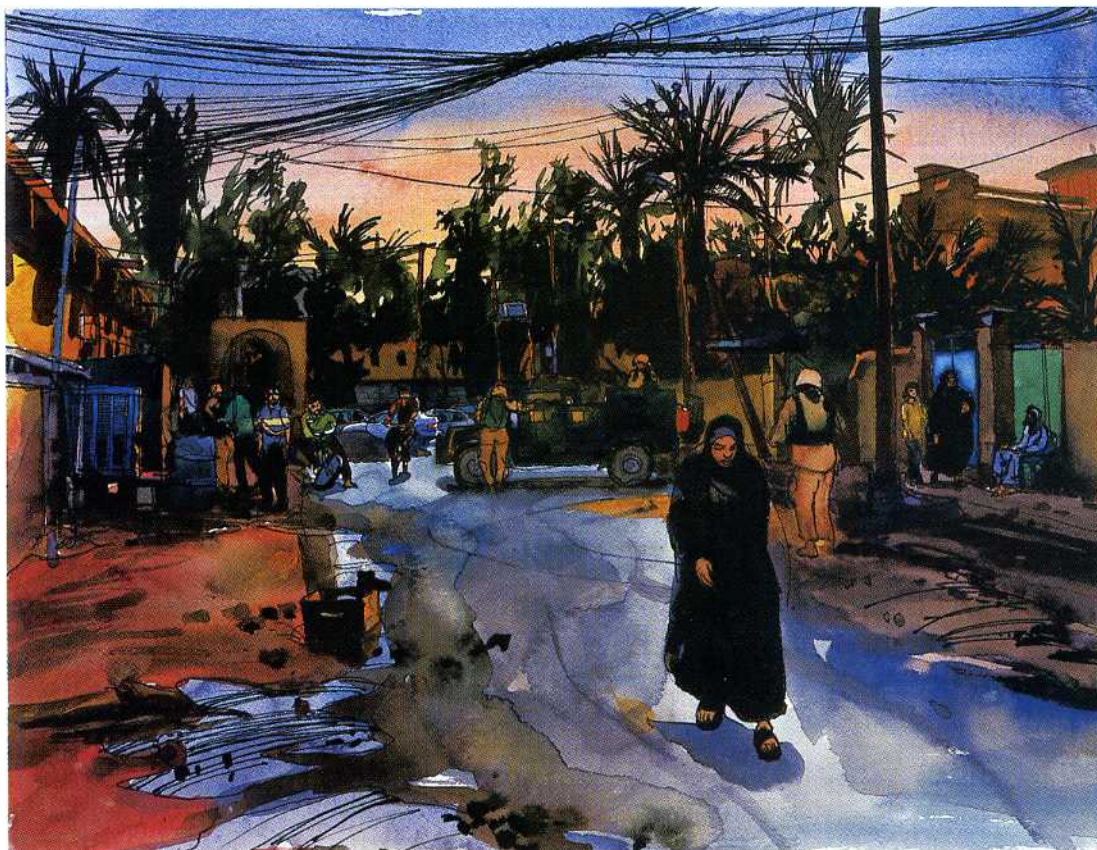


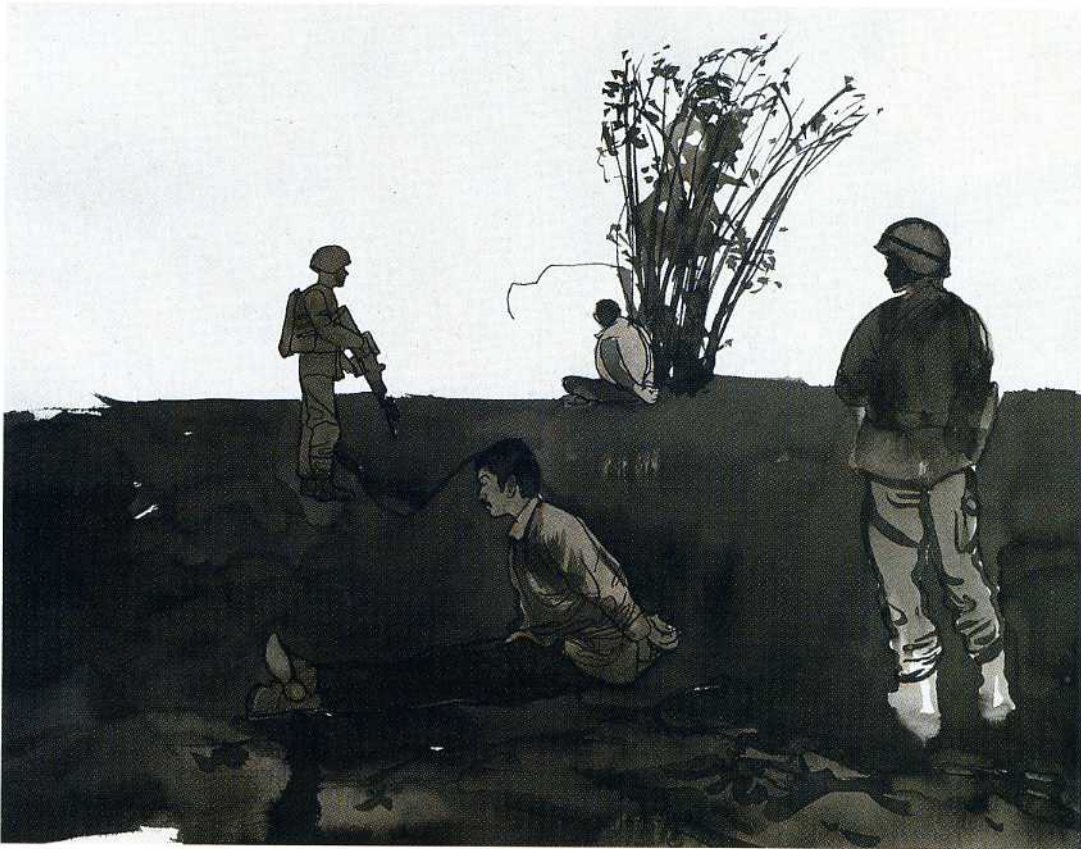
WATCHING THE TEMPEST

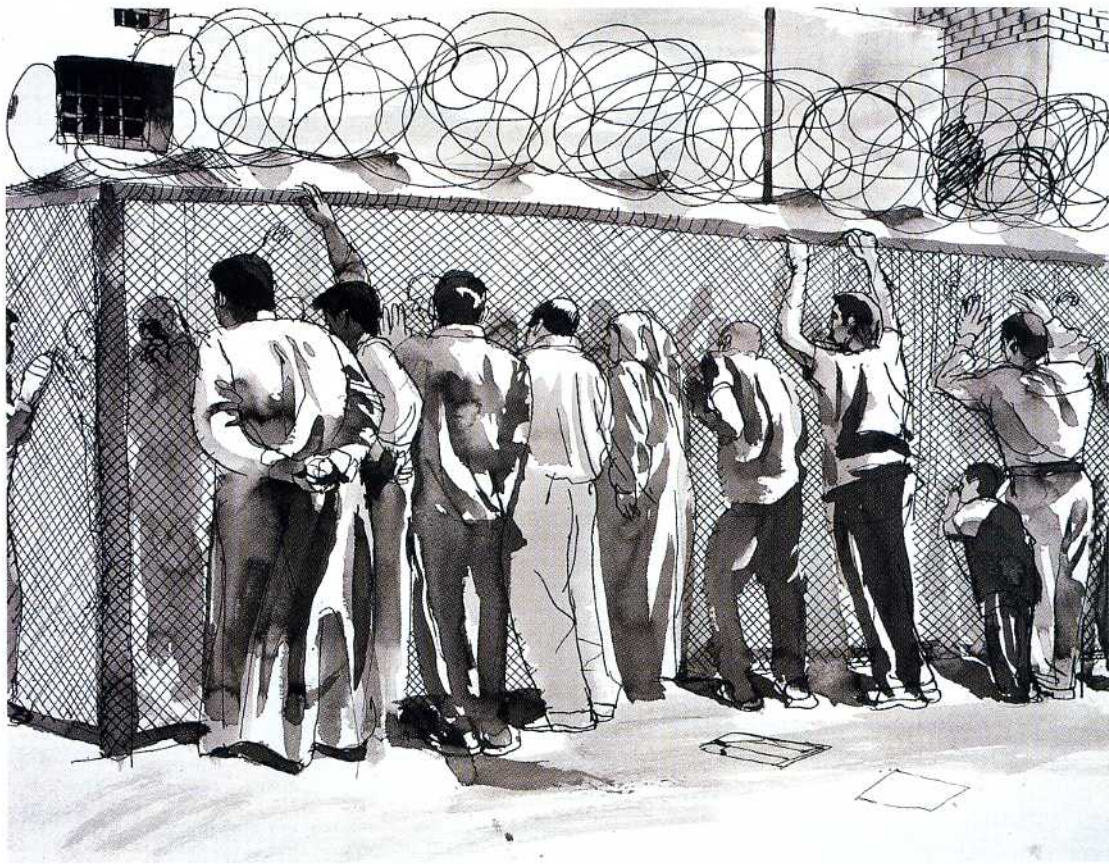
